MOONCOIN, PILTOWN & KILMACOW PARISHES ANNUAL PILGRIMAGE TO KNOCK SHRINE REPORT

The annual trip to Knock which has been going for well over 40 years took place last weekend 29th and 30th of July, 2023. 49 people left Mooncoin at 8am on Saturday morning after being blessed by Fr. Martin Tobin for a safe and spiritual journey. The trip was organised by Bridget McGrath and John Allen who did a wonderful and professional job and leaving no stone unturned to make the 2 days a memorable experience for all. We were in the safe hands of Alan Duggan of Duggan coaches. We stopped for breakfast in Tullamore and arrived in Knock at 3pm. Our accommodation was a few minutes from the shrine, and all were very happy with it. Dinner was served at 6pm and this was followed by mass at 7:30pm in the church of St. John the Baptist.

After breakfast on Sunday morning, the group assembled in front of the church for details of mass times and departure time that evening. Most of the group then headed to the Basilica of Our Lady of Knock, Queen of Ireland for mass at 10:30am. The weather was not great and we had rain most of the day. The museum in Knock is 50 years old this year and was visited by most of the group. The building contains many interesting items relating to the lives of the local people around the time of the apparition in 1879. Concelebrated mass followed by benediction in the basilica at 3pm. The chief celebrant was Parish Priest of Knock, Fr. Richard Gibbons. The National Novena at Knock shrine takes place from 14th to 22nd August. Our group bus departed Knock at 4:15pm and stopped in Tullamore for dinner. We had lots of entertainment on the way home, songs, jokes, banter and lovely tunes on the flute!

MEDIEVAL FIND

A Medieval Charcoal production Pit and Post-Medieval Copper Alloy Artefacts was found at the upgrading of the Tower Road junction, Piltown. As part of the planning for the project, a cultural heritage impact assessment was completed which recommended that further archaeological assessments be undertaken in advance of construction taking place due to the proximity of the site to the battle of Piltown in 1462 and to the discovery of remains during the construction of the Piltown/Fiddown bypass.

One archaeological feature, a shallow pit was discovered and excavated. The pit contained small pieces of oak charcoal along with some small stones, indicating it was a charcoal production pit. The sample sent to the lab to be dated, showed up as being belonged to the 11th Century and up to the mid twelfth Century. Charcoal making involves the slow burning of wood and at the same time controlling the amount of oxygen present. Charcoal production pits have been recorded at many sites around the country, varying in size and shapes. Charcoal production was carried out close to abundant and suitable woodland resources. Charcoal kilns can burn for several days and families of charcoal burners often lived on site.

A similar charcoal production pit was discovered during construction of the Piltown/Fiddown by-pass. Charcoal was used for personal or local use such as clearing toxins from the body. 2 button copper artifacts were also discovered probable lost by a member of a local 18th Century militia unit. On the face of the button is a crown and above and below the crown is the text "IVERK INFANTRY". The buttons date back to the latter part of the 18th century. The Right Honourable John Ponsonby was Colonel of the militia known as the Iverk Volunteers and the button was found on part of the former estate. A copper alloy chape or metal end of a scabbard was found in the same field. The artifact is made from a folded sheet of copper alloy. Because of its small size, it is probable from the scabbard of a small, bladed weapon such as a dagger. The artifact dates from the late medieval period or earlier post-medieval period. It is possible that the chape derived from the battle of Piltown in 1462.
